## Summer Conference Recap

"You can't write well without reading with a reader's eye." This was one of Lester Laminack's overarching themes during our first day of the summer conference. Lester constantly reminded us, writers ARE readers. In his lively, entertaining style he was able to give us a lot to think about. Lester has determined that the average college freshman is required to read 900 pages a week, and we aren't preparing students for this by the time they graduate high school. Students need to use texts from real authors in order to learn to write. Lester showed us many examples of how we could use read alouds to teach the Common Core standards in authentic ways to all grade levels. He also explained the importance of building schema in order for robust comprehension to happen.

The following day, Kelly Gallagher also discussed the importance of reciprocity in reading and writing. Gallagher reminded us of the declining scores, and much like Lester concludes that this is happening because children are not reading enough. He gave many suggestions for building reading lives that last in our students. Kelly also discussed how writing moves students into deeper levels of comprehension. Students should take time to stop in the middle of a novel to write what they are thinking. Gallagher gave many examples of ads, websites, texts, and news with biases and helping students become critical readers by noticing these biases. He also showed us three different ways of modeling writing, side by side, emulating the structure, and wide open. We

walked away with so many ideas to implement in our classroom and help our students read like writers.

As always, the conference left us rejuvenated and excited for a new school year (after a much needed summer break)! Thank you to all who came for your energy and enthusiasm.



## About ILLINOIS READS

Under the auspices of the Illinois Reading Council, ILLINOIS READS will be a yearly statewide project to promote reading for all Illinois citizens. Beginning with read aloud books for babies, 6 books will be selected for each additional age band through adult readers. A variety of topics and themes will be chosen for each age band. The work of Illinois authors will be especially highlighted. There will be a mix of hard covers and paperbacks, with several Spanish-language titles and Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM)-related books and the work of Illinois authors will be especially highlighted.

Working with the Illinois State Library, State Librarian, Jesse White, is the Honorary Chair. The Illinois Reads will focus on reading at home and in the classroom. Illinois Reads will also emphasize summer reading as a way to not only bring the family closer together but also to combat what is known as "summer learning loss" in children. Residents from Rockford to Carbondale and from Quincy to Danville will be able to partake in Family Literacy Nights sponsored by their local IRC chapters.

As part of Illinois Reads, which will culminate in a statewide celebration of literacy during Secretary White's Family Reading Night in November,



classrooms, public and school libraries, community groups, and community bookstores throughout the state will feature the titles of 36 books in six separate age groupings. Please watch the Illinois Reads website for more information to be posted or consider becoming an
